Our Newest Saints!

On September 7th, Pope Leo XIV will canonize two people who died at an early age: Carlo Acutis and Pier Giorgio Frassati.

Blessed Carlo Acutis was born in London on May 3rd, 1991. His family moved to Milan, Italy when he was a young boy. At an early age, Carlo had a profound love for God and the Church. In fact, his mother said, "Before Carlo's birth, I was really caught up in the culture of our time. I was a prisoner of everything that is relative and limited." But, "Carlo showed me how to live in my century while turning toward eternity."

Carlo had a passion for computer programming. He developed a website documenting Eucharistic miracles. He often said that, "the Eucharist is the highway to heaven. When we face the sun we get a tan... but when we stand before Jesus in the Eucharist we become saints."

This saint teaches us how we can combine technology with faith for the good of people. Carlo passed away in 2006 at the age of 15 due to leukemia.

Pier Giorgio Frassati was born in Turin, Italy on April 6th, 1901. His parents had a difficult marriage. His father was the founder of a newspaper, was very involved with politics, and did not attend Mass.

At an early age, Pier began to live out his faith. He never hesitated to share his faith with his friends. He would often make bets with his friends. If his friends lost, they would have to attend Mass with him or pray the rosary. He was an avid mountain climber, and loved the theater, opera, and museums.

Perhaps, however, his greatest preoccupation was caring for the poor. He had a long list of people he helped in his city with food, medicine, and clothing. He contracted poliomyelitis while finishing university studies. Neglecting his own health because his grandmother was dying, he suffered tremendously before dying at the age of 24.

Pier said, "Nothing is more beautiful than love. Indeed, faith and hope will end when we die, whereas love, that is, charity, will last for eternity; if anything, I think it will be even more alive in the next life!"

These two Saints remind us that it's not a matter of how long we live, but how we have lived as a disciple of Jesus.

ST. RAPHAEL

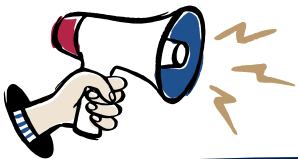
St. Raphael is named in the Bible in the book of Tobit. He is known as a healer.
